Doing laundry is most likely part of your every day routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire.

- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you.
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a qualified professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks.
- Make sure the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly.
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.

AND DON'T FORGET...

Dryers should be properly **grounded**.

Check the **outdoor vent** flap to make sure it is not covered by snow.

Keep the area around your dryer **clear** of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, etc.

Clothes that have come in contact with **flammable** substances, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

FACT

The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.


The Rural Hall License Plate Agency is located at 145 Bethania Street and is open from 9 am—5pm, Monday through Friday.

Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.

 Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries
- not designed for a specific use can be dangerous. Like any product, a small number of these batteries are
- defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.

 Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device. Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device. Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is
- fully charged. Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call 9-1-1.

- Battery Disposal

 Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option. Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community
- for disposal instructions. Do not put discarded batteries in piles

Charging an E-bike harging an E-bike large your battery in a flat, dry area larg from children, direct sunlight, luids, tripping hazards, and in a location the a-bike is not at risk of falling.
